THE BIOGRAPHY CORNER

The Biographies of Caulfield Residents

My Great-Great Grandfather Arthur John Reed

As told By

Mrs. Margery Bromfield

CAN YOU CLAIM TO BE A DESCENDANT FROM CONVCT STOCK?

It is the "in thing" these days to be able to prove that one's ancestors were of convict stock. To have forebears who were banished by the Courts of England to the Colony of New South Wales, or the Penal settlement of Van Diemen's Land, is to belong to a select band of people who qualify for membership of either "Descendants of the First Fleet", or "Descendants of Convict Stock".

The original Fleet sailed from Portsmouth, England, on 13th May, 1787, under the Command of Captain Arthur Phillip, a Royal Navy Officer, in charge of a fleet of six transports, three store ships, a frigate, an armed tender, and six hundred male and two hundred and fifty female prisoners, proved guilty of misdemeanours ranging from petty theft to murder. The Fleet arrived safely at Botany Bay on 20th Jaunary, 1788.

Historians are today claiming that many crimes were committed by the under privileged classes of England, in order to gain a free passage to the new land of hope, as the conditions in the New Australian Colony were, in many cases, proved to be superior to those which existed in England at that time.

Mrs. Margery Bromfield, a very keen member of this Society, can claim the distinction of having convict ancestors, and she has the official papers to prove it. She told our roving reporter that her Great grandfather, Arthur John Reed, after being tried at the Old Bailey, was convicted of horse stealing, and sentenced to deportation for life, to Port Arthur, Tasmania.

He sailed in the prison ship "Lady Harwood" during 1829, and arrived at Port Arthur later in the same year. After serving ten years of his life sentence, he was granted a Ticket of Leave in January 1839, and a Full Pardon in 1842.

While Arthur Reed was serving his sentence, he met a female prisoner, Helen Livingston, who was deported from Edinburgh, Scotland, to Tasmania, for stealing five flat irons from her employer. She sailed from Southhampton in 1829, in the prison ship "Nellish". She would have been in the same fleet as Arthur, but they did not meet until some time later, after arriving at Port Arthur.

During 1845, Arthur Reed, now a Free Settler, applied for permission to marry Helen Livingston, and after some delay this was eventually granted.

After their marriage in Tasmania, they eventually sailed across Bass Strait to the mainland of Australia, and settled in the mining town of Steiglitz, (Vic.).

Arthur and Helen had one son, who married Alice Kelnac, and they had fifteen children, one of whom was to become Margery Bromfield's father, and the descendants of this union have lived in Caulfield since 1910.

THE ELSTERNWICK CLUB

Sandham Street, Elsternwick

During the year 1898, a Joseph Tatchell conceived the idea of forming a club, to enable the "more prosperous members of Caulfield's community to meet on socially acceptable terms".

Jospeh Tatchell was a prominent local business man, who was very active in both the local A.N.A. and the then newly formed Progress Association. At his suggestion, a group of professional, and local business people, met at a two story shop in Glen Huntly Road, adjoining the "Phoebe Theatre", later renamed the "Renown Theatre".

At this meeting, a Committee was formed and authority given to purchase a building at a location suitable to the majority of members. It was also resolved that the name should be "The Elsternwick Club".

The first office bearers of the club were :-

During the following ten years the Club prospered, and in 1908, it was resolved that larger premises be obtained, with the object of setting up a three rink bowling green.

Subsequently a property was located in St. Georges Road, Elsternwick, and a three rink green established at the rear of this building.

By 1918, it was obvious that the building in St. Georges Road was not large enough to accommodate the influx of members, and a property then known as "Stanmere" was purchased for twenty thousand pounds (forty thousand dollars). This finance was raised partly by the sale of the premises in St. Georges Road, to the newly formed Returned Servicemens' League.

"Stanmere", home of the Elsternwick Club, still presents an almost unaltered old world charm and dignity. The National Trust of Victoria has recorded the building as being of considerable interest.

The land area is part of original crown allotment No. 260 to Thomas Monahan, in 1860, part of which included "Ripponlea".

Subsequent sub-divisions trace the property to W.H. Short in 1885, J.C. Melvin 1910, A.E. Lillie and E.W. Wilson 1920.

HAVE YOU MET TIKI?

Tiki is a horse, a loveable old Lady horse, who lives with Bernie and Francis Dingle in Balaclava Road, Caulfield.

When Francis goes shopping, Tiki is harnessed between the shafts of the Brake, and off they go. Tiki is very happy to be parked outside the large stores in Melbourne, or the smaller shops in Caulfield.

Customers feed her with apples, biscuits, bread, and all the other goodies a horse loves so much. Amid the clamour of the car, the thunder of the truck (which only eat petrol and oil), and all the other ills, which motorised transport has made us heir to, the Dingles and Tiki stand alone.

Behind the single fronted shop in Balaclava Road, Bernie and Francis carry on a trade of building horse-drawn carriages which today, is almost a lost art. Bernie is a coach builder, wheel-wright, blacksmith, fitter and turner, painter.

Just a few years ago, there would have been a team of tradesmen, each a specialist in his own trade, to do these highly technical jobs, now Bernie does it all himself. He makes the wheels, spokes, forges the iron for the wheels, makes the harness, upholsters the seats, shoes the horses.

("I can remember, as a very young boy, going to the blacksmith's in the country, and what a thrill to sometimes be allowed to pump the huge bellows that kept the coke fire burning, seeing the almost white hot iron shaped into horse shoes on the smithy's anvil. The aroma of burning hoofs, as the new red hot iron is tried on for size, is something unforgettable").

A few years ago Bernie was regularly making seventy sets of shoes for milk-cart horses, travelling to dairies all around Melbourne. No longer do we hear the clip-clop of those perfectly trained horses, which knew exactly at which house to stop, usually around five or six o'clock each morning.

The milk horses, together with the ice cart horses, have gone, but Bernie still has a few horse customers call into his shop for a personal fitting of a new set of shoes.

Visit the Dingle's stable, and it is impossible not to think one is in the country, on a farm, watching the afternoon sun brighten the many bundles of hay, seeing Tiki and his friends in their stalls, munching contentedly on their meal of hay, chaff, and occasionally oats, before settling down for the night, and looking forward to another day ahead.

Bernie and Francis Dingle are to be congratulated for keeping alive an historical tradition of this Country, which is unfortunately dying out, even in the country areas, where the friendly work horse has been replaced by the tractor.

SOME SAY IT IS PROGRESS

HOPETOUN GARDENS

GLEN HUNTLY ROAD, ELSTERNWICK.

The Hopetoun Gardens first came into being through the combined efforts of Dr. Weigall, a member of the Elsternwick Progress Association, and Mr. J. Haig, who was a prominent member of the Elsternwick Branch of the Australian Natives Association.

Both these Gentlemen had been aware for some time, that the Elsternwick Railway Reserve was not large enough to accommodate the hundreds of people who always came, every week-end, to listen and be entertained by the music of the Caulfield and Elsternwick Town Band.

Dr. Weigall and Mr. Haig negotiated with the owner of the land, now occupied by Hopetoun Gardens, and subsequently obtaining a Government grant, they obtained the assistance of Mr. Pockett, Head Gardner of the Malvern City Council, who was "borrowed" to advise on the planning of the new gardens.

Mr. Pockett began work in December 1907, and the Hopetoun Gardens were officially declared open, by the then Mayor of Caulfield, Councillor R.L. Phillips, on 31st July, 1908.

Councillor Dunbar obtained the ornamental trees and shrubs from the Botanical Gardens, and the Bandstand was moved from the Elsternwick Railway Reserve in 1909.

Investigations are at present in progress to obtain the history of the two cannons, dated (V.R.) 20/1/1881.

I WONDER WHAT HAPPENED TO MY FRIEND GLADDIE?

What ever happened to Gladdie, my old Gladstone Bag?

There was a time, it does not seem that long ago, when every boy and man owned one. It was the working man's friend and constant companion. The symbol of a boy's attainment to man-hood was to buy, or be presented with his first Gladstone Bag.

They have now, unfortunately, been replaced by all types of over-night travel bags, many of which carry advertisements for Air Lines, Tennis Shoes, or what-ever.

But you couldn't beat the old Gladstone Bag, or Kit Bag as it was sometimes called, until the war came along, and then "Kit Bag" meant something entirely different.

They were tough, durable, and democratic - not only were they carried by the "Blue Collar" worker, but by Clerks, Salesmen, Solicitors, and sometimes by Doctors.

Many a very good Gladstone Bag had a ridge worn in the middle of it, from being carried on the handle-bars of a push bike. At peak hours on the trains, and trams, there would be a dozen or more of them on the luggage racks, and a few more at the feet of their owners (What ever happened to the luggage racks?)

"Gladdie" was very versatile, they were used to carry lunches, tools, pyjamas for a week-end trip, or all the gear needed for footy or cricket practice.

Why did they go out of fashion? Perhaps one day they will come back, like waistcoats, double-breasted suits and baggy pants.

After all, there is no reason why they shouldn't, so can hats, which went out when hair came in. Perhaps someday too, the people who still smoke cigarettes will go back to "roll your own", remember when they were called "the makings" as distinct from "tailor made"?

If all that happens, we will have come the full circle and every thing will be much as it was twenty or thirty years ago.

That's backward progress, if you like, but who's to say we would be any worse off. At least we would have those friendly Gladstone Bags back again.
